From the Pastor...

On the day of Pentecost all the believers were meeting together in one place. Suddenly, there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm, and it filled the house where they were sitting. Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each of them. Acts 2:1-3

At Pentecost, as the Holy Spirit comes upon those first followers of Jesus, the winds of change blow and the refiner's fire burns away that which is unnecessary leaving only the important. The first followers who thought things would be one way (Jesus would be leading the movement) find themselves leading a religious revolution in ways they would never imagine.

This revolution arms itself with the story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. This revolution uses compassion, acceptance, and service as its tools of propaganda. This revolution is powered by God's own Spirit and finds its way even to us today.

It is hard to remember in the midst of change in the present (changes in worship), the uncertainty of the future (what will our new pastor be like), and fear of what is or what might be (declining membership) that God has already sent the Holy Spirit to be our Comforter in the midst of the uncertain. That God has already given us the Holy Spirit to give us the spirit of courage in the face of the unknown. That God has already given us the Holy Spirit to lead us into the new life that he calls to us in Jesus. Even as spring has finally come, so too has God's life giving Spirit bringing new life.

Again he said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you." Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. John 20:21-22.

Sometimes being a Christian is easy. Things fall in to place in our lives, and we praise God for all He's

done to make it happen. Then, there's times when things are tough......sometimes really tough. And we might say, "Sure God is in the good stuff. But what about when things get confusing and difficult?

Where is God then?"

For the Israelites, things were pretty tough when they were made slaves of the Egyptians. Things were pretty tough when the Egyptian army had them pinned against the Red Sea. They were all out of options. If they weren't killed, they would be taken back into slavery. The Israelites had no choice but to depend on God. There was nothing else left.

There's a famous saying that says, "When you get to your wit's end, you'll find that God lives there."

We all know from experience that being a Christian doesn't mean everything is good all the time. Just watch the news. Bad things happen all the time. We know that being a Presbyterian, or Baptist, or Methodist, or Lutheran doesn't mean we're not going to mess things up occasionally. Actually, we seem to find a way to mess things up on a somewhat regular basis.

How many times have we gone into Lowes or Menards and need help finding something, and it seems like all the people working the floor have scattered to parts unknown. Nobody is around, nobody can be found. That's kind of what it feels like when bad times visit our lives, isn't it? Sometimes, when we collide with problems, it seems everyone around us wants to scatter or distance themselves from us.

God's love is not like that. His Love is steadfast, not intermittent. His love is deep, not shallow. His love is offered first, not as a response to our love. God's love is always present, it never hides from trouble. God does not love us based upon our performance. There is nothing we can do to cause God to love us any more than He already does. And there is nothing that will cause God to love us any less.

God loves us not because of who we are, but because of who He is.

This is so hard for us to understand, since we mostly experience only conditional love that's based on what we do. Perform well on the job, or on the team, or in the relationship and we're loved. Mess up in our performance, and we are immediately ostracized from the team. Mess up in a relationship, and we no longer qualify to be loved.

Understanding that God loves us no matter what, will keep us going when the love of those around us

fades or disappears. When our love for ourselves is finally torn and broken down, when the next mile seems intolerably long, when we experience darkness, when we feel pain and loneliness, God's love is always there. His love is steadfast. His love is deep....wide...and great.

God's love is forever.

PNC, MIF, PIF, UPC, CLC, are just a few that we've used in the last few months on our committee work alone. PNC has brought on a whole new meaning to us as we work together on the pastor nominating committee. After having spent quite a bit of time together I can honestly describe our PNC as:

- (P) Passionate, the people on the PNC are so passionate about the work they are doing.
- (N) Navigating, we have been navigating thru the process of calling a new pastor, navigating thru personal information forms, and navigating thru the ups and down of the process.
- (C) Committed, the committee members are very committed and are working hard and spending a lot of time together to find the very best Pastor for our church!

Over the past month the PNC has been meeting once per week recruiting applicants, reviewing personal information forms of pastors who have shown interest in our position and listening to sermons provided by the applicants. There are several possibilities but we continue to recruit as we work through the process looking for the perfect fit for our congregation. We have also been finishing

up on questions we would like to ask on first telephone interviews and perfecting answers to questions the applicants might ask us. You can only imagine finalizing questions and answers with eight different people around the table. There has been a little groveling going on but only to the extent to make our questions and answers perfect.



We will meet again on May 1st to review new applicant's personal information forms, to find new ways of getting the word out about our position and to review questions we want to ask.

Many ask "How can we help?" As we show Passion, as we Navigate, as we show our Commitment, we need you, our congregation, to be on your own sort of PNC. As members of our church we ask you to be:

- (P) Patient, we are working as quickly as we can yet this process takes time and we want the best possible outcome. We also ask you to...

Before the session meeting on Wednesday, April 18, the session members joined with the confirmands, their mentors and parents to enjoy a meal and fellowship. Also attending were Jared Long, Pastor Bill and Kay Hall. It was interesting to hear about the confirmands journey of faith.

There were several topics of discussion during the regular session meeting. The Worship Committee shared a letter to be sent to the congregation concerning the changes to the worship schedules which will be coming. More information to be coming soon.

Approval was granted to our secretary/treasurer to change her work schedule beginning May 1. Jessica will be scheduled to be in the office all day on Monday and Wednesday and then on Friday morning.

Our church will be hosting a meeting of the Presbytery on Tuesday, May 22 so the next few weeks will be busy making plans and getting ready.

Some different security options for the church were looked at with no decision made but will be requesting Property to explore some more possibilities. At this time the East and North doors are locked at all times (there will be needed exceptions) and the office will be locked when no one is physically there.

In the sanctuary they are getting close to finishing the lighting- check it out. Hopefully the end of the project is near and the congregation (near and far) can enjoy the results.

The Pastor Nominating Committee is working on the questions they will be asking during interviews in the next few weeks. They have been given a most important task so be sure to keep them in your prayers asking God to guide them in their work.

Sanctuary Project Update

The audio visual portion of the Sanctuary Project has been completed. Butch and volunteers have received training on the new equipment and are working to learn the new technologies and implement them in worship. Butch has been working with Dave Hendrickson to get issues with the live feed of the worship services to those gathering at the UP Home and it is getting better every week now. We will be going 'live' with both live and archived worship services later in May and will let you know how you can connect when it is ready.

The lighting project is coming along nicely now that they are started. As I write this the folks from Eyes and Ears are installing the lighting on the soffits around the church and the pendant lights are being relit. When the lighting is all installed and electrically wired the last step with be to have a programmer from Gopher Lighting come and program the lights. The results will be noticeable.

The project looks to be staying on budget. We have had to delete a few items in the contract as other things came up that were needed to stay within our budget. There has been some additional expenses (just over \$700.00) most of which was to repurchase the hearing assist devices.


The Kingdom Kids
