

## The journey continues....a message from Pastor K

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work. . . . Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many. ~ 1 Corinthians 12:4-6, 12-14

I recently received a text message from my siblings letting me know our mom's car isn't drivable. The tires have air, the engine is ok, the windshield wipers work, the doors open and close, the heater blows hot air, the air conditioner blows cold air, the car is registered, it is insured, etc. and yet the car can't be driven because it's missing a part . . . just one small part. The car is missing a working battery.

Now it really doesn't matter which part of one's car is missing . . . battery, window, door, engine, fuel, heater, etc. If your car is missing a part it simply won't run as well as it will if all its parts are up and running at their best. The same is true of the church . . . the Body of Christ. For the church to run at its best, it needs all its parts up and running, from the smallest and simplest to the largest and most complex. Can you run a church without greeters? Yes. But imagine arriving on someone's front doorstep for a dinner party and, after ringing the doorbell, the door opens but no one greets you or invites you in. No one smiles at you or says, "I'm glad you were able to make it" or offers to take your coat or shows you where to sit or any of the other things that make one feel warm and welcome when they arrive at someone's home. It's a little thing but it means a lot. In this church we need volunteers for the small and simple tasks of being greeters and ushers, bakers and servers, people to help take out the trash or clean up after the Fellowship time, fold bulletins and newsletters, etc. in accordance with the gifts you have been given. We also need volunteers who are willing to take on larger responsibilities such as being an Elder, a Deacon, a teacher, a CE helper, a committee member, a musician or singer, etc. in accordance with the gifts YOU have been given. Without the help of everyone who claims membership in this church, the Body of Christ here at United Presbyterian Church can't possibly function to the best of its ability. We need the time, talent, and money of the whole church to be an effective, efficient part of Christ's Body at large.

Do you remember the vision statement that came out of the mission study the church did with Pastor Bill? It says, "Transforming lives by sharing our experience of God's love and acceptance." That's not who the church is right now. The church's mission statement says who the church is right now is reflected in the words "Love God. Love Others." "Transforming lives by sharing our experience of God's love and acceptance" is who the church is aiming to be in the future. To get there, every part of the Body of Christ known as United Presbyterian Church will need to participate. The church's vision statement refers to "our experience" not the experience of two or three people. "Our" experience refers to the whole of the church's experience of God's love and acceptance. Since that is the case, this is a great time for the members of the church to start thinking about how the church can use these experiences to transform lives through worship, through stewardship, through missions, through Christian Education, etc. The vision of the church is solid, and the church's future is bright. Set your eyes on the goal and get going! Together, we CAN make a difference. . . . the journey continues.

## Love God. Love Others.

Bernie & Farsijana Adeney-Risakotta are missionaries living and working in Indonesia that you are supporting monthly. Their vision is for "reconciliation, justice and peace among people of all faiths in Indonesia." There are currently more Muslims in the world than the combined populations of China and the United States. Bernie and Farsijana have been working with Muslim tea farmers in a program on globalization at Duta Wacana Christian University. The program has helped Muslim farmers in the area deal with tourism change in the area due to the New Yogyakarta International Airport near Borobudur, which is the largest Buddhist temple in the world. Muslims and Christians do not agree on many important relgious issues, but we can respect each other and work together for the common good.



Pipe organs produce several types of sounds, each caused by pipes of different materials and construction. In our sanctuary, you can easily see square, cylindrical, and cone shaped pipes made of either metal or wood. Some of the wooden pipes look like they have handles on top. Those projections are plugs that make each pipe sound an octave lower than without the plug.

Types of sound: Principal/Diapason (characteristic organ sound—the main voice of the organ); flutes (like blowing into a pop bottle or jug); reeds (vibrating metal tongues that buzz in the air stream); mixtures (preset combination of several pipes sounding when one key is depressed); mutations (play an F and hear a C, for instance); and some sounds that imitate particular instruments or the human voice. In addition, our instrument has a Tremolo on the swell that produces vibrato for sounds coming from the swell box.

General types of pipes are flues (chimneys) and reeds (the ones with vibrating metal tongues.) The organ responds to changes in temperature, which affects the pitch of each pipe. With temperature fluctuations, the flues travel up or down (in pitch) together, but the reeds (trumpet, trombone, fagott, etc.) are in tune with the rest of the instrument only at the temperature at which they were tuned. Thus, I can use the big Posaune stop on Easter because that one was tuned in the spring. The rest of the year, it might sound weird. In winter when the west wall is really cold, the organ sounds fine until the room begins to warm. Then, for a couple of hours, it sounds like a circus calliope until all the pipes warm up and play nicely together again.

The swell division, played from the upper keyboard

on the console, has 748 pipes, all of which are housed in the boxes above the choir loft. The shutters on the swell boxes, operated by an accelerator-type pedal on the console, make it possible for the organist to adjust the volume of the enclosed pipes by covering or uncovering their mouths, so to speak.

The great division, played from the lower keyboard, has 672 pipes, all of which are out in the open. Most of the great division pipes are located in the loft on the west wall. The bourdon—a 16' cylindrical metal rank—resides behind the large cone-shaped pipes on the south wall.

The pedal division's 364 pipes are spread around. The huge wooden pipes of the Kontrabass stop rest on the north wall shelf. The Subbass's smaller wooden pipes with knobs on top appear toward the north end of the west wall. The Fagott (bassoon) is behind the Subbass; the Spitzflote, Choral Bass and Mixture are also in the west loft; and the Posaune (trombone) and trumpet for the pedal are the cone-shaped metal pipes on the south shelf.

The chimes, which hang on the west wall behind other pipes, were saved from the organ of one of our parent churches. These chimes, playable from the lower manual, are completely separate from the carillon that plays outdoors. In April of 1999, Casavant representative Carroll Hanson spent two days climbing around in the sanctuary and tapping on every pipe, giving the instrument its first and only complete tuning ever.) He used an extension ladder to reach the walkway behind the pipes on the west wall, where there is enough room for a person to walk or crouch down, and crawled inside the swell box through a door on the north side. He also climbed up on the north side of the sanctuary to check those big wooden pipes and found a few balloons stuck up there. I was glad when Jared Long produced tethered balloons last Easter and nothing got away from him. On the south side, Carroll did most of his work from the ladder, reaching with a notched metal rod to tap the tuning collars on

The largest pipe we have is 16 feet long, made of oak, and weighs 300 pounds. When the north pipes

were installed in the 1980s, Carroll was concerned about how he would manage, even with scaffolding. His helper, a huge guy from Wayland, picked up one end of the biggest pipe, walked it up to a vertical position, and said "Where do you want it?" Carroll was astounded! They finished installation of north side pipes in about half a day. He later commented that there's enough lumber up there to build a garage.

In contrast to the 300-pounder, the smallest pipe in the organ weighs less than one ounce and lives in the swell box. It is about a foot long and the diameter of a drinking straw, with a speaking part shorter than a pencil eraser.


The organ's breath comes from a blower in the basement. Tubes feeding air to the wind chests under the pipes travel up from the basement through the brick columns beside the west window. When switch on the console is turned on, the organ puffs up its chests, getting ready to play. It sounds very much like huge

lungs inhaling.

In February 2018, Susan See brought students and parents to play our organ, listen, and learn how it works. Carroll Hanson came for the occasion and explained in detail the construction of each type of pipe and how sound is produced (vibrating metal tongue or wind blowing over a pop bottle, for instance). He also sug-

as students played their prepared pieces. Adults and kids alike enjoyed both the organ and harpsichord, the mechanical and structural aspects as well as the wildly different sounds that can be produced from acoustic instruments.
